ASCV STARTS SCHOOL YEAR WITH TWO EXCEPTIONAL LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES!

The amount of information parents of children with autism must learn can be overwhelming!! The ASCV will offer two workshops on diverse topics this fall that will equip you with much needed information.

September 11 Special Needs Trust Workshop and Resource Fair

Attorney Paula Peaden will kick off the night with an overview of special needs trusts and the ABLE Act, both of which will allow families to put aside money for their child's future without jeopardizing their child's eligibility for public benefits such as Medicaid Waiver or Supplemental Security Income. Following Ms. Peaden's presentation, Gail Henshaw, with Commonwealth Community Trust, will share information about pooled special needs trusts and why this type of SNT may be a worthwhile option when future planning for your loved one with a disability. Before and after the workshop, families will have an opportunity to visit the Resource Fair, featuring six organizations that assist with Special Needs Financial Planning. TAKE ACTION! AUGUST 11TH DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE UPDATE **ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE U.S. vs VA SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT**

At The Arc of Virginia 2015 State Convention, the Department of Justice (DOJ) gave a status update on the implementation of the U.S. v Virginia Settlement Agreement; the presentation can be found here: http://www.thearcofva.org/wp-content/uploads/2015/03/DOJ-8.11-1215-lunch-pres.pdf.

DOJ also facilitated a feedback luncheon in which the audience discussed I/DD issues and wrote letters to DOJ sharing their stories as they related to areas of non-compliance. The Arc of Virginia staff is currently working to compile the stories collected at the luncheon and through electronic story submissions. Stories will be shared with DOJ prior to the upcoming public status hearing on the U.S. v Virginia Settlement Agreement, scheduled for October 23rd at 10:00 am at the Federal Courthouse in Richmond. A HOME OF YOUR OWN HOUSING & SUPPORTIVE SERVICES INITIATIVE WORKSHOP

River Road UMC

September 28, 2015 6:30pm-8:30pm

This workshop will provide information on the Governor's 100 Day Initiative on Virginia's Housing and Supportive Services (HSS) and innovative ways to access affordable, accessible, and integrated housing. Integrated, independent housing offers a contract with tenancy rights in buildings and neighborhoods where there are natural ratios of people with disabilities and the opportunity to choose where individuals with developmental disabilities live, who lives with them, and who supports them.

Bradford Hulcher, Program Director for the ASCV and a member of the Richmond area HSS team, will lead this workshop. Bradford is the parent of a young adult who has been through this process and now lives in his own apartment with supports.

To be eligible for this initiative, one must:

- be 18 years of age or older and
- have an intellectual or developmental disability

and

- receive or be eligible for an ID or DD Medicaid Waiver, or

- reside in an institutional setting.

The ASCV hosts bi-monthly Sibshops as an opportunity for brothers and sisters (ages 7-12) of children with any developmental disabilities to obtain peer support and education in a fun recreational environment. (Siblings older than age 12 are encouraged to email outreach@ascv.org about volunteering with our Sibshop program.

Sibshops acknowledge that being the brother or sister of a person with special needs is for some a good thing, for others a not-so-good thing, and for many somewhere in between. They reflect a belief that brothers and sisters have much to offer one another. The Sibshop model intersperses information and discussion activities with recreation and games (designed to be unique, off-beat, and appealing).

Sibshops are not therapy, although the effect may be therapeutic for some children. While Sibshop facilitators always keep an eye open for participants who may need additional services, the Sibshop model takes a wellness approach.




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

CHILDREN'S CRISIS SERVICES

Fact Sheet for Providers

Who is eligible?

Individuals under 18 years of age with a documented intellectual or developmental disability and experiencing mental health or challenging behavioral needs. Region IV REACH admissions are approved based on the team's review of individual needs, situation, and assessment information.

What will REACH Children's Crisis Services do?

Region IV REACH children's providers will be available 24/7 to provide mobile crisis intervention and stabilization as well as on-call services to eligible youth and their families. Region IV REACH does not offer out of home residential crisis placement to individuals under the age of 18 years.

Services may consist of:

- Phone Triage
- On-site crisis stabilization
- > Short-term follow-up/linkages to services

REACH's Role with Emergency Services

Region IV REACH staff are *not* certified pre-screeners and will *not* replace Emergency Services (ES) for mental health crises. Region IV REACH will collaborate with ES to help stabilize individuals in crisis and decrease need for hospitalization.

During a crisis, REACH may:

- Provide consultation and on-site support during ES pre-screens
- Assist with crisis de-escalation, engage in problem solving, and assist individuals with use of coping strategies
- > Provide family support and education
- > Connect families with additional local services
