IDEAS FOR RAISING AWARENESS IN APRIL FOR NATIONAL AUTISM AWARENESS MONTH

What can you do to raise awareness in your school, neighborhood, or faith community during National Autism Awareness Month in April? You might:

- Purchase or make an autism awareness lapel pin; wear it every day during April. (The ASCV has lapel pins available for purchase.)
- Create a bulletin board at your school, faith community of place of work to raise awareness about autism. Themes could include the warning sides of autism, the strengths of people with autism or famous people with autism.

 - Growing Up Together Teens with Autism (For Middle School-Aged Peers) This 4-page, booklet is written for teenagers. It uses basic language to talk about what autism is and how to be friends with someone on the autism spectrum

Bullying and Autism Spectrum Disorders

April 12 Monthly Meeting

Kids with Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) experience difficulties in communication, interaction and imagination, and often find the social world difficult and confusing. Many parents of children with autism are well aware that their children are bullied at school, but more recent research suggests the problem is pervasive. One study found that 46% of middle and high school students with ASD have been bullied. By comparison, in the general adolescent population, an estimated 10% of children have been bullied.

Staci Carr, Ed. M, M.S., will discuss the ways bullying happens (from teasing to cyber bullying) and what can be done to help our children cope with bullying as well as strategies to address bullying.

Items of Interest from the 2013 General Assembly

The General Assembly's final Budget Bill has gone to the Governor's office for review and signing. The General Assembly reconvenes on April 1, 2013. Items of interest to the autism community include the following:

200 additional Intellectual Disability (ID) Waivers The 200 ID Waivers provided are in addition to the 375 ID Waivers that were already in the budget. This means that a total of 575 new ID Waivers will become available effective July 1, 2013.

50 additional Developmental Disability (DD) Waivers The 50 DD Waivers provided are in addition to the 80 DD Waivers that were already in the budget. This means that a total of 130 new DD Waivers will become available effective July 1, 2013.

Maintenance of Medicaid Eligibility for Waiver Services The introduced budget included language that would have reduced Medicaid financial eligibility for waiver services from 300% of SSI to 267% of SSI. This proposed reduction would have meant that some people who currently receive ID/DD Waiver would lose their services and supports.

Funding for 25% increase in group home funding for people with complex needs.

Expanded Community-Based Crisis Services for Children and Adults with ID/DD

\$3.8 million is provided to expand adult crisis services. \$1.25 is provided to develop and implement children crisis services.

Funding for early intervention services to reduce shortfall.

Waiver Supported Employment Providers May Bill for Job Development/Placement It is anticipated that this change will increase access to individual supported employment for Virginians with intellectual and developmental disabilities

Additional Funds Department of Aging and Rehab Services (DARS) Vocational Rehabilitation Program This will bring approximately 1000 individuals off of the waiting list.

Partners in Policymaking Free Training Program for Parents and Self-Advocates

Are you the parent (or guardian) of a young child with a developmental disability (DD)? Or are you a person with a developmental disability? If you are, or know someone who is, now is the time to apply for a free training program called

Partners in Policymaking (PIP). Only 30 people from across Virginia will be chosen to be Partners. Classes (on Friday evenings and Saturdays) begin in September 2013 and will conclude in May 2014. Eight sessions are held; lodging, meals, training, and transportation (plus individual accommodations such as personal care attendants and interpreters) are paid for participants in Partners. Topics covered in the sessions include independent living, assistive technology, supported employment, and history of the disability rights movement. Partners practice presenting testimony and learn about impacting the legislative process. Download the applications are

The goal of the project is to get exposure for the children on the autism spectrum in a professional art gallery, and giving them a huge event and show to be proud of."

One Family's Journey

My husband and I were stunned after our son's diagnosis. We didn't know anything about autism. Our only frame of reference was a movie we had seen years earlier, "Rain Man". The doctor was not helpful and didn't give us any information regarding therapies or what we could do to help our son. Maybe he didn't have access to that information or maybe he thought we wouldn't hear anything else because we were still in a state of shock. He did give us the phone number to the Autism Society Central VA. Family and friends tried to encourage us, but no one knew how to help us.

When I made that phone call to the Autism Society, it felt like someone had thrown me a lifeline. Finally, I had someone who understood what I was going through, another parent just like me. Coming home from a meeting from the Autism Society helped me feel empowered. The speakers were knowledgeable and gave me valuable information that taught me how to understand and help my child.

The Autism Society wants to change the way you view people with autism: to see ability instead of disability, to see a person instead of a label, to see an opportunity instead of a challenge, to see strength instead of weakness, and to see the value of each person no matter what their level of ability may be.

What the Society does- informative monthly meetings, lending library, newsletter, websites, emails alerting members to important information, sponsoring trainings and seminars, information about other resources in the area and support groups. Learn about medical issues, educational rights, government policy, insurance regulations and so much more. Everything you need in one place to navigate the complex world of autism.

I'll never forget those parents I met through the Autism Society in the early years when my son was first diagnosed. They always took the time to talk with me and answer my questions. They shared their stories with me, letting me know that I was not alone. They listened to mine as well, giving me advice and encouraging me. I learned so much from them. They

gave me a different perspective from their years of experience. With time, I became a strong advocate for my son with the knowledge I gained from the Autism Society.
