VDOE AUTISM PREVALANCE RATES RISE 11% AUTISM SOCIETY POSITIONS TO MEET NEEDS

The Virginia Department of Education's most recent Annual Child Count (2012 - 2013) reflects a dramatic one year increase in the number of school aged children identified as having autism. The count for the 4 school districts in metro Richmond are reflected in the following numbers for last year:

Chesterfield: 683 Hanover: 279 Henrico: 549 Richmond: 252

These numbers do not reflect the number of preschool children who are identified under the educational label of Developmental Disability (DD), some of whom will be identified as having autism once they turn 6.

The Autism Society Central VA recognizes the growing needs in the metro Richmond community. We are often the first point of contact after a family has received the news; we want to insure that **every** family and individual affected by autism is aware of the resources we offer. The ASCV is THE local source for individuals with autism, from newly diagnosed through adulthood.

Through workshops and Information & Referral, the Society helps individuals and their families understand and access what can be an overwhelming system of supports including special education, Medicaid Waivers, Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Social Security Disability Income (SSDI). The ASCV provides recreational and social opportunities for children, youth and adults with autism and their families. And we advocate at the local and state level, by serving on numerous public policy work and advisory groups and through legislative advocacy, for better supports and services for individuals with autism in the areas of education, employment, transportation, housing, Medicaid Waivers, and much more.

We have spent the last year involved in the *Organizational Improvement Process Pilot* with the Partnership for Nonprofit Excellence. Out of that process, we identified the need to build capacity through strategic planning, board development, and marketing and fund development. The board and staff of ASCV have spent the summer working long hours with a consultant to develop a strategic plan, the results of which will be shared with our community this Fall.

The Autism Society, the nation's leading grassroots autism organization, exists to improve the lives of all affected by autism. We do this by increasing public awareness about the day-to-day issues faced by people on the spectrum, advocating for appropriate services for individuals across the lifespan, and providing the latest information regarding treatment, education, research and advocacy.

New Individual and Family Support Program (IFSP) Funds Available September 3

The Individual and Family Support Program (IFSP) is designed to assist individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities who are on the waiting list for the ID or DD Waiver (and their families) to access short term person/family-centered resources, supports, and services. IFSP funds may be provided to individuals or family members in varying amounts, as requested and approved by DBHDS, up to the established annual maximum of \$3000.00 per individual per fiscal year

The new start date for FY 2014 will be September 3. Applications will not be accepted before this date. Applications will be submitted via on-line web based application through DBHDS website and paper application through U.S. Mail. An expanded directions guide has been created to assist people with filling out the application and load. Applications will **not** be accepted via fax or e-mail. A debit card system will be implemented for FY14. Checks will only be sent when an applicant requests payment go directly to a vendor.

Services and items that may be funded through IFSP may include:

- Professionally provided services and supports, such as respite, transportation services,
- behavioral consultation, and behavior management;
- Assistive technology and home modifications, goods, or products that directly support the
- individual;
- Temporary rental assistance or deposits;
- Fees for summer camp and other recreation services;
- Temporary assistance with utilities or deposits;
- Dental or medical expenses of the individual;
- Family education, information, and training;
- Peer mentoring and family-to-family supports;
- Emergency assistance and crisis support; or
- Other direct support services as approved by DBHDS.
