### New Online Course Available for Parents of newly Identified Children with ASD

"My Child Was Just Identified with an Autism Spectrum Disorder: Now What Do I Do?" a self-paced online course, is a collaboration between the Virginia Commonwealth University Autism Center for Excellence (ACE) and the Virginia Autism Council (VAC). Autism Society Executive Director Bradford Hulcher served on the VAC Training Committee that developed this training and is featured in 2 of the modules.

The course is designed for parents who have young children with an autism spectrum disorder to introduce families to the characteristics, needs and recommended services for young children with autism spectrum disorders. A brief description of the defining characteristics of an autism spectrum disorder is provided. The focus of the course, however, is on effective services, supports and strategies. Modules include:

### Directions to ASCV meetings River Road United Methodist Church

#### From the East:

-64 West to Exit 181 Parham Road South

\*Drive 2 miles till you reach a traffic light for River Road. Be in the left hand land and turn left onto the on ramp. At the stop sign turn right on to River Road

\*\*Go approximately .2 miles and the church will be on your right. Turn right onto Doverland Road. Turn right into the church parking lot. To the back left of the church is a door that says "office". Go into this door and meetings are held inside at the first dorr on yur right.

#### From the West:

I-64 east to Exit 181 Parham Road South.

Follow all directions that are written above for coming from the east.

#### From the North:

I-95 South to I64 west then follow the same directions as written above under the East.\*

#### From the South:

## Local School Celebrates National Inclusive Schools Month

The week of December 5 was National Inclusive Schools Week. My son James (JP) attends Jacobs Road Elementary School's Autism Program. His teacher Mrs. Zylstra (Mrs. Z) spearheaded this initiative and as she put it "your children helped me lead the way".

JP came home that week with a sticker that read, "My Principal is Proud of Me". Asked why Ms. Burgess was proud of him, JP said, "Ms. Burgess smiles, pledge of allegiance, roar, proud and so happy." I shook my head in agreement and smiled even though I did not understand; the bottom line, JP knew Ms. Burgess was proud and he did something good.

Later that day, JP's teacher called, explaining that each child in her class got a turn to do morning or the afternoon announcements that week. (I had no idea he knew these by heart so I asked him to recite them to me and he did without missing a word!) Now his statement about why he had the sticker made sense!

The 5<sup>th</sup> graders gave Mrs. Z a list of things they wanted to know about inclusion/exceptionalities. She answered their questions before the class visited and said the 5<sup>th</sup> graders were amazing with our children. JP's class has a standing date to do activities with that class again!
