NEWS FROM THE AUTISM SOCIETY, CENTRAL VA BOARD

Board member Kelly Domaleski has been appointed interim Treasurer through early September.

The board welcomed Adam Bailey as a new board member. Adam lives in Glen Allen, is a graduate of Radford University and a CPA with Keiter. In his free time, Adam enjoys golf.

We worked to "improve the lives of all affected by autism" in June in the following activities:

Advocacy

 Attended the Fairness Hearing on the DOJ Settlement Agreement.

- Participated in the Region IV START (Systemic Therapeutic Assessment Respite and Treatment) Advisory Council, which will address the Crisis Stabilization portion of the settlement agreement. We raised concerns that individuals with developmental disabilities and children were not included thus far in the planning, as mandated by the agreement.
- Participated at the June TACCID (The Advisory Council for Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities) meeting where Commissioner Stewart presented an update on implementation of the Commonwealth's Settlement Agreement. We raised concerns that planning across many of the targeted areas, such as Crisis Stabilization and Employment First, included individuals with Intellectual Disabilities, but not Developmental Disabilities, as required by the agreement.
- Participated in the First Annual Statewide Steering Committee Meeting for Virginia START (Systemic Therapeutic Assessment Respite and Treatment).

- Presented to Capitol One employees with Autism Society National VP for Programs, Jennifer Rapella.
- Board member Bill Thompson, along with his wife Betty, gave a presentation on the work of the chapter to Keystone Insurers Group.

Pooled Special Needs Trusts: Preserving Assets for People with Special Needs

A special needs trust is a tool that allows funds to be set aside for an individual with a disability to be used for supplemental needs that will improve, to the extent possible, the quality of life of the Beneficiary. Proper administration of a special needs trust ensures that the funds are available solely for the needs of the Beneficiary and can benefit an individual who needs assistance managing their finances.

Special consideration should be made for individuals receiving SSI and Medicaid benefits. In order to qualify for SSI and Medicaid, an individual cannot have more than \$2,000 in cash assets. When an individual with a disability receives a sum of money from an inheritance, settlement due to an injury, social security back payment, monetary gift, or sale of an asset, those funds threaten the individual's eligibility for SSI and Medicaid benefits. However, funds that are placed in a special needs trust will not jeopardize these crucial benefits.

Estate planning attorneys, financial planners and case managers can give their perspectives on long-term financial planning that will best suit your particular situation. Once you are ready to establish a special needs trust, you must select a trustee. The trustee manages disbursements, invests the funds, reports to government agencies and keeps up with changing regulations. Because the regulations are complex and constantly changing, it is important to select a trustee that specializes in these types of trusts. One option is a pooled special needs trust, which is established and administered by a non-profit organization. A separate account is established for each

Beneficiary, but the funds are "pooled" to provide greater investment opportunities and lower administrative expenses.

CCT does not require a minimum amount to fund a trust and has been chosen by more than 850 clients nationwide.
