NEWS FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As the school year begins, I have exciting news to share with our membership and the local autism community! But first a little background information is in order.

In the Fall of 2012, the Autism Society Central VA was chosen as one of four non-profits to participate in a 9 month pilot program offered through the Partnership for Non-profit Excellence to identify what the ASCV should do to build capacity to better serve the local autism community. Following this process, our board and staff embarked upon 3 months of Strategic Planning over the summer to further drill down and identify areas for growth over the next 3 years. This was a very exciting process; the board and staff are excited to share the results of the planning in our October newsletter after the board votes on our 2013/2014 budget in September.

During this year long process, it became apparent to me that the role of Executive Director would require much more time devoted to administration and fund development and much less time focused on programs and advocacy. It is for this reason, effective around December 1, that I have decided to assume the new position of Director of Programming and step down from the position of Executive Director. My passion is in the programming and advocacy that the ASCV provides to children, youth, and adults with autism, their families, and our community; remaining in the position of ED would have moved me further away from the work that I love. The ASCV currently offers over 20 programs in the areas of information and referral, education, and recreation. We collaborate with many other agencies and organizations on workgroups and boards to impact public policy affecting individuals with autism and their families. This is the work that I absolutely love and where my focus will continue to be as Director of Programming around December 1!

The board of the ASCV plans to hire a new Executive Director with skills in non-profit management and fund development to begin around December 1. I'll have more news to share about new programs and events planned for the coming year in our October newsletter. Stay tuned!!

ATTENTION INDIVIDUALS ON ID OR DD WAITING LISTS!

APPLICATION PROCESS FOR INDIVIDUAL AND FAMILY SUPPORT FUNDING OPENS SEPT. 3

The Individual and Family Support Program (IFSP) is designed to assist individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities on the waiting list for the ID or DD Waiver (and their families) to access short-term person/family-centered resources, supports, and services up to \$3,000 per year.

Services and items that may be funded through the Individual and Family Support Program may include:

- Professionally provided services and supports, such as respite, transportation services, behavioral consultation, and behavior management;
- Assistive technology and home modifications, goods, or products that directly support the individual;
- Temporary rental assistance or deposits;
- Fees for summer camp and other recreation services;
- Temporary assistance with utilities or deposits;
- Dental or medical expenses of the individual;
- Family education, information, and training;
- Peer mentoring and family-to-family supports;
- Emergency assistance and crisis support; or
- Other direct support services as approved by Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS).

Individual and Family Support Program funds may be provided to individuals or family members in varying amounts, as requested and approved by DBHDS, up to the established annual maximum of \$3000.00 per individual per fiscal year.

For the Fiscal Year 2014 the funding cycle will start September 3, 2013. Applications must be submitted via online web based application through DBHDS website or paper application through U.S. Mail. An expanded directions guide has been created to assist people with filling out the application. Applications will not be accepted via fax or e-mail. ASCV TO OFFER TWO NEW PROGRAMS

During strategic planning that took place with our board over the summer, we identified the need to expand the age ranges of individuals we are currently serving to include individuals who are outside of the "school aged" population we currently serve. We are excited to announce two new programs - one for adults on the spectrum and one for preschoolers on the spectrum.

Is Your Child On The ID, DD, or EDCD Waiver & Receiving Medicaid? Learn about Health Insurance Premium Programs (HIPP)

Are you aware that that the Department of Medical Assistance Services (DMAS) offers programs that may allow you to maintain your child on your private insurance and pay all or part of your health insurance premium?

- 1. **HIPP For Kids** program is a premium assistance program that may be available to children under the age of 19 years of age who are eligible for Mediciad that pays their entire health insurance premium.
- What makes me eligible for HIPP for Kids?
 - A household member must be eligible for Mediciad and be less than 19 years old
 - Must have/be able to get insurance through your employer
 - Health insurance must meet program criteria
- Health Insurance Criteria the insurance must provide comprehensive medical coverage and your employer must pay at least 40% of the total cost of the health insurance premium.
- Is there a cost to enroll in HIPP for Kids? No
- 2. **HIPP** program is a premium assistance program that may be available to people with Medicaid that helps pay <u>part</u> or all of their health insurance premium.
- What makes me eligible for HIPP?
 - A household member has to have Mediciad full coverage
 - Must have/ be able to get insurance coverage through your employer
 - Health insurance must meet program criteria, including cost effectiveness.
- Cost Effectiveness Criteria means that it costs the Mediciad program less to pay for your health insurance costs than to directly pay for all your medical costs; this is done by comparing the average cost for your Mediciad eligible family member to the cost of your insurance premiums.

-64 West to Exit 181 Parham Road South

*Drive 2 miles till you reach a traffic light for River Road. Be in the left hand land and turn left onto the on ramp. At the stop sign turn right on to River Road
