This session will feature self-advocates representing a variety of post-secondary educational options for individuals with developmental disabilities. Students from VCU ACE-IT, Courage to Succeed, and other colleges will share their experiences in a panel presentation.

Medicaid Waivers and a Life in the Community

Ever wonder exactly how Medicaid Waivers can be used to include people with disabilities in the community - at home, at work, and at play? Join Hanover Arc's Lucy Cantrell and the ASCV's Bradford Hulcher as they share information on this important topic.

Legislative Panel

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

From Our Executive Director

The vision of the Autism Society Central VA is to be the local voice and resource of the autism community in **education**, **advocacy**, **services**, **and support**. In all that we do, we are committed to meaningful participation and self-determination in all aspects of life for individuals on the autism spectrum and their families, at any age and any stage.

In October, we educated almost 40 family members and service providers on the IEP process. Each of these individuals left the 4-night IEP Boot Camp with a binder full of information and resources, and better able to advocate for individuals with disabilities within the school system. One of the parents who attended, Allison Thurman, shared this about the experience, "The ASCV IEP Boot Camp held in October was an INCREDIBLE training experience for my husband and me in our journey with our son through the public school system. Unlike many other IEP training opportunities that are often expensive and that primarily address the IDEA regulations, the ASCV IEP Boot Camp emphasized person-centered planning and a long term vision for your child, approaches for collaboration, and lessons learned form the instructors' personal experiences. What a great opportunity this was for all the parents that attended!" The ASCV was able to offer this educational opportunity thanks in part to a grant from the Networking of Enterprising Women (N.E.W.)

In our November Newsletter, you will find examples of many ways in which we will be working to achieve our vision in the next few months. I hope that we will see many of you at our regular monthly activities (Lego Club, Bowling, Adults Group, etc...), and at the Life in the Community 3rd Annual Conference, the VCU Woman's Basketball Game, the Tacky Light Holiday Bus Tour, and on DD Advocacy Day at the General Assembly! ONE VOICE MAKING A DIFFERENCE FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH AUTISM, WILL YOU JOIN US?

In late September, the ASCV was contacted by staff to the Autism Advisory Council (AAC), a legislative work group of the VA General Assembly. Members of the AAC wanted to hear from families impacted by autism about their experience with the Virginia's "service system" for individuals with autism. ASCV member Karen Isik took time off from work to share her experience with the AAC...

As Autism Warriors, we do it all. We eat, sleep, dream, and live Autism 24/7/365. What would you do if asked to take your advocacy to the next level? Example: speaking to our appointed lawmakers here in the Commonwealth. Would you accept the challenge?

In September, I had the opportunity to do just that! I spoke to the Autism Advisory Council (a group of lawmakers and other



professionals appointed by the General Assembly) to tell the true story of my family's life in AutismLand. Many of these groups only hear from the health system, disability groups, and other government appointed agencies. What they don't get is the "real" story; our struggle with the system, lack of services, limited accessibility to special equipment, etc. These folks got to witness the true struggle of their constituents/community by my words, body language, and tears. This was a very powerful message for them to witness.

You might ask yourself; will my voice make a difference? I question you, how will you know if you don't try? I have received two personal phone calls and three emails from the board members or the audience who want to help my son! Keep in mind, many of our children do not have a voice. We have to be that voice!

I hope to see you at the next event!

VIRGINIA RANKS 49TH IN OUTCOMES FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH INTELLECTUAL AND DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

Currently, there are almost 9,000 Virginians on the ID or DD waiting lists for Home and Community Based Medicaid Waivers.

Every year since 2006, United Cerebral Palsy (UCP) produces The Case for Inclusion, an annual ranking of how well state Medicaid programs serve Americans with intellectual and developmental disabilities (ID/DD). Individuals with ID/DD, including the aging, want and deserve the same freedoms and quality of life as all Americans. The Case for Inclusion ranks all 50 states and the District of Columbia (D.C.) – not on their spending – but on their outcomes for Americans with ID/DD.

The Case for Inclusion shows how well each individual state is performing overall; how each state matches up against other states regarding key data measures; and, most importantly, the top performing states with policies and practices that should be replicated. In 2014, Virginia fell from 47th place to 49th place.

Steps you can take to make a difference:

- Attend the November 15 "Life in the Community Conference" and participate in the Legislative Panel at lunch time. Local senators and delegates and their representatives will be on hand to answer your questions and concerns.
- Contact your legislators <u>now</u>, before the General Assembly session begins in January, and let them know that you expect better for Virginians with developmental disabilities. You can find the names and contact information for your legislators here: http://whosmy.virginiageneralassembly.gov/
- Plan to join the Autism Society Central VA and other advocacy communities from across the state for Developmental Disabilities Advocacy Day on January 26 at the General Assembly.


