From Our Executive Director

Our Advocacy Does Matter!

On January 26, 2015 I had the honor of riding the DD Advocacy Day van with a group of eight other family members from Chesterfield County to visit with our legislators at the Virginia General Assembly. It was a dreary, cold, and rainy morning and I could feel some anxiety amongst the group as we boarded the van and settled in for the ride downtown, as none of these individuals had visited the General Assembly or had contact with their Senators or Delegates before this day. Because of the weather, the scheduled Rally at the Bell Tower was cancelled, so once we cleared the security check-point, we regrouped and all traveled together to the first scheduled legislative visit. Our small group visited in the offices of two Senators and four Delegates throughout the morning, sharing pictures of family members, stories, and information on proposed legislation that would make a positive difference in the lives of their constituents with developmental disabilities.

Sometimes, it's simply the unknown that causes the angst in us. I was so proud of every one of the individuals who traveled on that van with me this year. Each and every one overcame their nervousness and eloquently shared their story in a powerful way. They shared statistics of the number of individuals on waiting lists for Waiver services in VA, the importance of state-wide regulations and education for school employees on restraint and seclusion, and the impact removing the age limit from insurance laws would have on families. The energy in the van was very different on the way back to the parking lot in Chesterfield. There was an air of empowerment and confidence now. Stories had been shared, friendships had been made, and I truly believe these individuals will be our leaders on the journey next year!

When you receive this newsletter, I will have just returned from visiting with our elected officials in Washington, D.C. at the National **Day on the Hill**. Representatives from the Autism Society, and other Affiliates from across the United States, and I will have visited with legislators and our nation's key leaders to advocate for legislation to improve the lives of the millions impacted by autism spectrum disorder across this country every day. The **Day on the Hill** provides a unique opportunity to raise awareness among these leaders and key influencers about the work we do and the issues affecting the communities we serve. I am, as always, honored to represent the Autism Society Central Virginia on these visits, and to share information on behalf of individuals and families in Central VA.

Thanks to ALL who attended 2015 DD Advocacy Day with the Autism Society Central VA and the many other advocacy organizations involved, including the individuals who traveled with us on the vans from Chesterfield and Henrico and the ones who met us downtown! Our Advocacy Does Make A Difference!

I AM SO GLAD THAT I WENT TO DD ADVOCACY DAY

On January 26 self-advocates, families, and staff traveled to the General Assembly for Developmental Disabilities Advocacy Day. Thanks to ASCV member Dawn Fortin, mom to Jacob, for sharing her experience!

Being a member of the Autism Society, I was aware that a group goes every year to the General Assembly to advocate for more and better services for those on the autism spectrum. I would feel guilty when I read about it in the newsletter, thinking how quick I am to complain about the need for change, but doing little to make it happen. I would tell myself that if I was a better public speaker I would go. After all, what if I start to cry? Or my voice does that funny thing it decides to do when I speak in front of a large group? Then there's the hassle of traffic and parking. I don't know my way around Richmond very well. No way could I go.

This year the Autism Society took away one of my excuses by offering transportation to and from the GA and I decided I couldn't be intimidated any longer and signed up to go. A few days before DD day, you emailed me pointers and information on how to share my story. I didn't need to know a lot of ins and outs about policies and bill numbers. I just shared what things are like for my son and our family as he is on the waiting list for the DD Waiver.

On DD Advocacy day, I boarded the van and was given a folder with my timeline and a map of the State Capitol. There was also one folder that was left with each delegate or senator from the Autism Society detailing ways they could help those with developmental disabilities.

The advocates who rode in the van from Chesterfield decided to stay together and support one another. Nobody had to speak in front of a huge room full of people or use a microphone (that is what I envisioned), we just went to the senator's or delegate's office and spoke there.

I would tell other self-advocates and family members that they should go to DD Advocacy day next year. If I had know that the process was this simple and how empowering it is to speak and be heard for your loved one, I would have been going every year.



FIRST ANNUAL CENTRAL VIRGINIA AUTISM CONFERENCE

Keynote Address: *Relentless Positivity (And a Little Bit of Caffeine)*

Jennifer O'Toole, has brought global audiences to tears as parents and teachers feel that, for the first time, Asperger's is presented without stigma, judgment, or foreboding but instead, with humor and compassion. This is the first hand life experience of Temple Grandin Award Winner, Aspie, teacher, social worker, and Asperkid parent (x3). It's a truly "insider" look at anxiety, the power of special interests, learning detours, and above all, real empowerment through effective strategies, constant respect, and infectious, relentless hope.



Jennifer will share information in morning and afternoon breakout sessions:

- ***See-Through Eggshells and Chalk on the Trampoline: Building Extraordinary People through Ordinary Stuff***
- ***Been There. Get That: The Secret Social Rules Every Aspie Needs to Know (But No-one Ever Tells Us).***

Other conference sessions will address additional topics:

- **Parents have Power! How to Help Your Child Develop Social and Communication Skills** – Dawn Hendricks, Ph.D. This session will teach parents and caregivers to promote their child's social and communication development by teaching how to work on these skills during play and daily routines. Strategies will be provided to enhance a child's communication skills by helping him/her to learn how to request, gain attention, and ask for assistance. Strategies to develop social skills including waiting, sharing, and playing will be shared.
- **Using Positive Behavior Supports at Home** – Justin Creech, PBFS Positive Behavior Supports can promote positive behaviors at home. Participants will gain knowledge and understanding of prevention, teaching, and reactive strategies through real life examples. The session will cover basic functions of behavior and variables that affect behavior.



The day will end with a panel of teens and young adults from across the spectrum each sharing their journey, gifts and abilities!

FREE WORKSHOP ON APPLYING FOR SSI/SSDI MARCH 23, 2015



Join us Monday, March 23 from 7 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. for a presentation by Steve K. Waldron titled ***Age 18: Social Security Disability Determination/Re-determination, Applying for SSI & SSDI and Understanding SSI Work Incentives***. This presentation explains Social Security benefit rules when a child turns age 18. Included is the adult definition of disability, how & when to apply for benefits, and how the application process works. It also provides an overview of work incentives which allow Social Security beneficiaries to work and keep their cash and health insurance benefits.

Steve K. Waldron has a B.A. in History-Political Science from the University of Montana and a Master of Social Work from Virginia Commonwealth University. Currently, he is head of the Social Security Solutions Division of Flying Raptor Consulting. For over a decade, he was the Senior Community Work Incentive Coordinator (CWIC) for the vaACCSES WIPA (Work Incentives & Planning Assistance) project.
