TRANSITION TO ADULTHOOD WITH ASD: WHAT PARENTS AND GUARDIANS NEED TO KNOW

Are you familiar with the options and opportunities for your child with autism as they exit public education? It's never too early to begin learning and planning for life after high school!

Parents spend an enormous amount of time learning how to navigate the special education system so that their children can access the free and appropriate education to which they are entitled. Unfortunately, we find that families often wait until their child exits school to learn about the systems and agencies that may offer support to their child as an adult.

Transition to Adulthood with ASD: What Parents and Guardians Need to Know, developed by the VA Autism Council, is designed to provide an overview of important factors and topics to consider as individuals with ASD enter the adult world. Focus is placed on parents/guardians understanding eligibility vs. entitlement in the adult service system, planning to protect benefits, agencies and organizations that provide supports to adults with ASD, and the variety of options to consider in planning. Topics include:

- age of majority
- disability benefits and planning
- · post-secondary readiness, education, and training
- employment
- housing and residential supports
- life in the community

The workshop is appropriate for anyone interested in learning more about the factors to consider as the individual with ASD transitions to adulthood, including:

- Parents/family members of individuals with ASDs
- School administrators
- General and special educators
- Community service providers
- Adult service providers

OCTOBER 7th ASCV MEETING & WORKSHOP A BRAIN IN YOUR POCKET: MOBILE DEVICES AS AIDS TO INDEPENDENT LIVING

Join us Friday evening, October 7 at 7pm for this free workshop on how assistive technology can address the needs of individuals with ASD across the spectrum and across the lifespan!

Smartphones, personal digital assistants, and tablets can be powerful assistive technologies for people with cognitive-behavioral challenges. Portable, versatile, and easily configured with appropriate apps, these devices can be used to address everyday problems at home, work, school and in the community. Professor Tony Gentry, the director of Virginia Commonwealth University's Assistive Technology for Cognition Laboratory, will discuss strategies for using mobile technologies for time and task management, task-sequencing, way-finding, behavioral adaptation, augmented communication and video modeling, based on the results of a series of community-based trials with populations including students and young adults with autism and brain injury. Case studies will underline successful strategies to solve everyday challenges. Attendees will be provided with a catalog of tried-and-true mobile apps, and links to instructional materials for further learning.

 performance. The Quiet Room will also have family bathrooms, fidgets, ear-plugs, mats and
 chairs available for any patrons needing them.

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
