Into the Light

NEW DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES WAIVER WAITING LIST INFO DO YOU KNOW YOUR PRIORITY LEVEL??

Under Waiver Redesign, waiting list criteria has changed. Everyone who is waiting for a Developmental Disabilities Waiver is now prioritized on the waiting list as a Priority 1, 2, or 3. Only those individuals assigned Priority 1 will have the opportunity to be considered for available waiver slots by the local Waiver Slot Assignment Committee. Several families have recently contacted the ASCV with concerns about their assigned Priority Level. We have shared several important messages with those families that we hope will be helpful for all families with a loved one on the DD Waiver Waiting List. To insure that a loved one is placed in the correct Priority Level, it is critical to:



- be frank and forthcoming with the case manager about your ability to care for your loved one <u>without</u> waiver supports,
- provide a detailed description of issues affecting your ability to care for your family member with autism,
- share information regarding any physical or mental health issues that may significantly impact your ability to care for your loved one,
- share information regarding risks to your loved one, yourself, or other family members because of your loved one's behavior OR physical care needs such as bathing or toileting, or medical needs that you cannot manage on your own, and
- share if your son or daughter is no longer receiving services through IDEA, is under 27, and is transitioning to independent living.

Do you have documentation of your Priority Level yet? If not, your case manager can provide it. If you do not agree with the assigned level, you might need to provide additional information to your case manager to justify a higher Priority Level. If your Priority Level is not changed after informal conversations with your case manager, you have the right to a formal appeal.

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

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
