Into the Light

CREATING MEMBERSHIP IN THE SCHOOL AND CLASSROOM COMMUNITY

Join the Autism Society Central VA (ASCV) from 7-9pm on Monday, November 13, 2017 at River Road United Methodist Church (8800 River Road, Henrico, VA) for a FREE workshop on Creating Membership in the School and Classroom Community.

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) requires that students with disabilities receive their education, to the maximum extent appropriate, with non-disabled peers. While the law does not define inclusion specifically, it is clear that the intent of the law is to make sure that kids who receive special education services are included in the general education classroom as often as possible. However, inclusion is a philosophy that goes beyond placement in a general education class. It also aims to have a child be a part of the school

What does it mean to be a member of the school community? Come and hear nationally known speaker Cyndi Pitonyak talk about strategies to help facilitate turning your child's Least Restrictive Environment (LRE) into a meaningful and enriching setting. Cyndi will discuss ways of establishing the basics of membership for a school and classroom community and how to creatively address those basics for all students.

Cyndi has over 30 years of experience as a special educator. She has teaching experience at both elementary and secondary levels in inclusive, self-contained and residential settings, as well as special education administration experience at the school and district level. Cyndi has been invited to testify before the United States Senate HELP Committee and interviewed by ProPublica and National Public Radio regarding her work in inclusive education. She has provided technical assistance and training to school divisions nationally and internationally and has taught at the college level in undergraduate and graduate level special education teacher preparation programs. Cyndi currently works for the VCU Autism Center for Excellence.

IT'S NEVER TO EARLY TO START THINKING ABOUT TRANSITION!

The Autism Society Central VA (ASCV) is excited to host two learning opportunities in November focused on Transition. The goal of these workshops is to empower parents to better advocate for their transition age child and to equip students with the tools to better advocate for themselves. Come learn how engaging transition services early and continuously can provide a foundation for success when entering the adult world (life after high school) and can be an investment in an individuals' total well-being.

First, join us at River Road United Methodist Church on **Friday, November 3, 2017 at 7:00 pm** for a FREE I'm Determined Family Night!

Students in grades 5-12 and their families will not want to miss this fun and educational opportunity! The I'm Determined project is a state directed project funded by the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE). *I'm Determined* focuses on core components of self-determination, which include self-advocating, choice making, decision-making, and problem solving. By providing opportunities through direct instruction and modeling, the project strives to facilitate youth to undertake a measure of control in their lives, helping to set and steer their course rather than remaining a silent passenger.

On the evening of Friday, November 3rd, come hear the journeys of some of the youth leaders from the *I'm Determined* project as they share their stories, challenges, and discoveries of empowerment. Learn about the tools developed to help youth share who they are, what they strive to do, and who might help them as they travel their road to self-determination. Jackie Neidle, MS, NBCT, a Program Specialist at the VDOE Training and Technical Assistance Center (T/TAC) at VCU and member of the *I'm Determined* project, will facilitate the evening. Each family will take home a Toolbox for Self-Determination so that the discussion can be continued at home.

Then come back on Saturday, November 4th at 9:00 am for a FREE workshop on IEP Transition Services in Special Education.

Transition is the process students and their families use to prepare for life after high school, to identify outcomes, and to plan community and school experiences to ensure that the student acquires the knowledge and skills to achieve their goals. Transition planning is a process mandated by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) for all students who have an Individualized Education Program (IEP). In Virginia, the IEP must include transition planning and services by age 14. Therefore, it is important for parents of middle school, high school, and even elementary school students to understand transition services.

This workshop, *What's Transition Got to do with It? EVERYTHING!* will review the transition requirements that are in IDEA. The presenter, Marianne Moore, Secondary Transition Specialist at the VA Department of Education, will also share specific information on what parents/guardians really need to understand about transition services to ensure thoughtful planning and implementation of individualized programs.

Tammy Carlson's passion for serving families and students with autism led her to joining the ASCV as the Recreation Facilitator for Childcare and Bowling in September. Over 20 years ago, Tammy's oldest child, born with Down syndrome, opened the door to special education for her. After traumatic education experiences with her daughter, Tammy was driven to support other children and families. She began her special education teaching career in Vermont in 2008, which put her on the path to becoming an autism teacher. After relocating to Virginia in 2014 with her three children, Tammy strengthened her skills as an autism teacher for students in secondary education. Nonspeaking individuals are of particular interest to Tammy. She is currently attaining endorsement to support the communication, education, and inclusion of

nonverbal, minimal, and unreliably speaking individuals via spelling to communicate for individuals with motor impairments affecting speech. Tammy's daughter and her students are her greatest teachers.

Erin Boatwright joined the Autism Society Central VA as the Recreational Facilitator of Lego and Game Club in September 2017. She has an associate's degree from Jamestown Community College in Occupational Therapy Assistant and works as an OTA at the Amelia Skilled Nursing Facility. Erin has been working with children with autism since 2011. Previously, Erin worked as a teacher aide in a preschool classroom for children with special needs. She has participated in many community organizations and is currently volunteering at Wings of Hope Ranch to help disabled horses and children. Erin has recently moved from New York State and is looking forward to making Virginia her new home.

THANKSGIVING TIPS FOR KIDS ON THE SPECTRUM

Thanksgiving can be a fun time filled with food and family. However, all of that may be a little overwhelming for kids on the spectrum. Here are some ideas that you may find helpful this Thanksgiving season.

- Prepare your child a few weeks ahead.
- Try to keep the day as close to your child's typical schedule as possible.
- Make sure to have bring a few favorite toys/games with you if you are visiting others.
- Give your child a safe, quiet space to "take a break" in case of sensory overload.
- Consider seating your child at the end of the table.
- Praise good, appropriate behavior.
- Ask for help if you need it. Keep your expectations realistic and reasonable.
- Plan an exit strategy with your spouse/partner.


