


VDOE RELEASES DECEMBER 2017 CHILDCOUNT NUMBERS



As of December 1, 2017, the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE) reports that over 21,000 students, ages 4-21, in public schools in Virginia were identified as having a primary IEP diagnosis of autism. Over 3,000 of these students are right here in the Central Virginia area. The VDOE numbers do not include young children not yet identified, individuals in private schools, individuals without IEPs, individuals with IEPs that list the primary diagnosis as something other than autism, or adults on the autism spectrum.

As the prevalence rate of autism has continued to increase over the past 10 years, so has the number of students with a primary diagnosis of autism in Virginia's public schools. Recent numbers released by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), show the prevalence rate of autism is now 1 in 59 children. The Commonwealth of Virginia public schools have seen an increase of 158% in autism prevalence from 2007-2017.

Theories vary on the cause for this increase in numbers, but what is known is that more and more individuals are living with autism today. Thus, there is an even greater need for appropriate services and supports in order for individuals to lead independent and self-sustaining lives. The Autism Society Central VA continues to share this and similar information in an effort to educate all in our community about the need for increased services and supports so that all individuals living with autism can lead a life full of dignity, value, and respect.

I recently read a quote by Joseph Campbell that reads, "We must be willing to let go of the life we have planned, so as to have the life that is waiting for us." I was deeply moved by this quote.

As many of you know, I LOVE to be organized and I love to plan my life as much as possible. My plan was to graduate college, get a job I enjoyed, marry the man of my dreams, buy a house with a white picket fence and have 2.5 kids. However, if there is anything that my son, Eli, has taught me in the last 13 years it is that the best things in life are never planned. As most of you know, Eli was born 2 months prematurely (this was not my plan) and we received the formal diagnosis of autism before his 3rd birthday (this was definitely not part of my plans). I quickly had to learn to adopt to a new way of life.

This is what I have learned on my "unplanned" autism journey with Eli:

The autism diagnosis first brought me great sadness. But I have learned that when you arrive at your lowest point you are just at the starting line of your highest point for greater understanding, strength and joy.

I have learned that Eli hates loud unexpected noises yet he is one of the loudest kids I know.

I have learned that I am vulnerable. I'm not exempt from life-altering circumstances, nor am I excused from the lessons they teach us.

I have learned that Eli reciting every Disney movie line can be quite entertaining. "What do you have to say for yourself, Space Ranger?"

Autism has taught me that no matter how much I try, I can't control my life but I have learned that I am more than capable of handling challenging days.

I have learned that Eli's smile and crazy dance moves bring much joy and laughter to many.

I have learned that the thing I can't change ended up changing me. Changing me to a better more compassionate person!

I have learned that autism means something to me far beyond Eli. Yes, autism is part of my life, but I recognize it is part of many people's lives, too. Thank you all for your support not only to help Eli but to help all those in our community diagnosed with autism.

UPDATE ON EXPANSION OF AUTISM INSURANCE BENEFIT

The biennial budget bill that was signed into law by Governor Northam on Thursday, June 7th, provides for an expansion of the autism insurance benefit to age 18 in the state employees' health insurance plan.

The exact wording of the budget amendment is as follows:

8. Notwithstanding the provisions of § 38.2-3418.17 and any other provision of law, effective October 1, 2018, the Department of Human Resource Management shall provide coverage under the state employee health insurance program for the treatment of autism spectrum disorder through the age of eighteen.

During the 2018 General Assembly session, there was a lot of support for bills to expand coverage. Three house bills and one Senate bill were introduced. Three of these bills were identical and would have removed the age limit for coverage: Delegate Danika Roem served as patron of HB 1113; Delegates Collins, Filler-Corn, Bagby, Boysko, Davis, Krizek, Plum, Rasoul, and Simon served as patrons for HB 1311; and Delegates Plum, Bagby, Boysko, Bulova, Delaney, Gooditis, Hope, Krizek, Lopez, Rasoul, Simon, Turpin, and Tyler were patrons of HB 1369. All three bills died in committee.

Senator Jill Vogel carried SB 593, which passed the Senate and died in the House Appropriations Committee. Her bill was identical to the House bills but was amended in the Senate to put an age cap of 18 on coverage.

While the House and Senate bills failed, the budget does extend coverage to 18 as part of the state employees health plan. This could be considered a first step in extending coverage in general, because the state employees health plan does have a fiscal impact on the state. Commercial plans will not be required to extend coverage to 18, because no bill passed to provide for that. But having the state cover the autism benefit to 18 might serve as an incentive for the commercial plans to follow suit.
